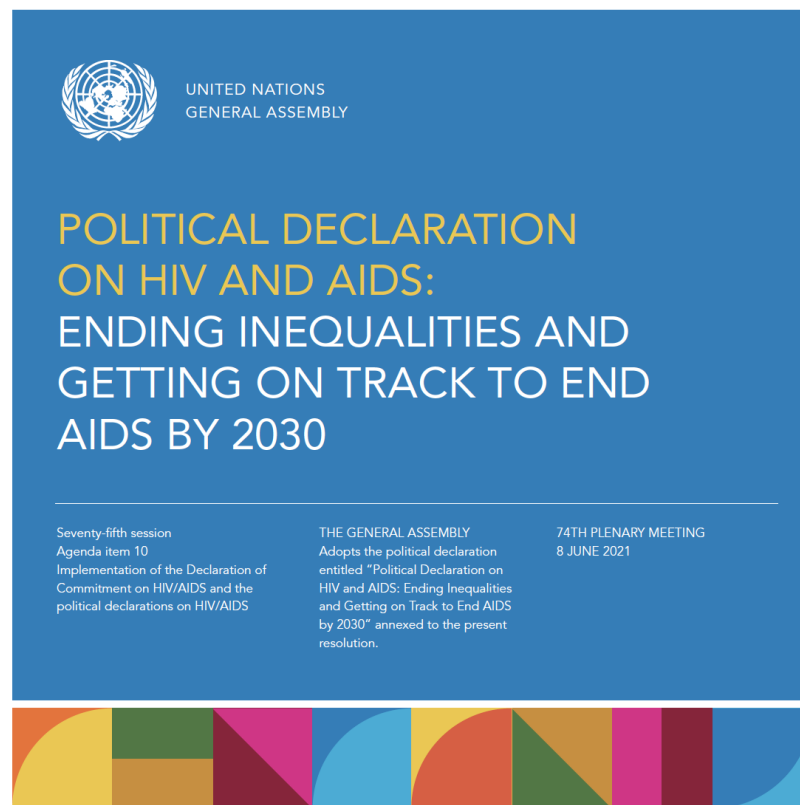


Political Declaration Commitment to GIPA Principle

“[Member States] **Commit to the Greater Involvement of People Living with HIV/AIDS principle and to empower communities of people living with, at risk of and affected by HIV, including women, adolescents and young people**, to play their critical leadership roles in the HIV response...”

Through:

- Inclusion of communities in decision-making
- Enabling environments for civil society
- Financing
- Community-led monitoring and research
- Scaling up community-led service delivery



Political Declaration Commitments to Scale up Community-led Service Delivery

In line with the 2021-2026 targets included in the Global AIDS Strategy, Member States committed to

“[Increase] the proportion of HIV services delivered by communities, including by ensuring that, by 2025, community-led organizations deliver, as appropriate in the context of national programmes:

- 30 per cent of testing and treatment services, with a focus on HIV testing, linkage to treatment, adherence and retention support, and treatment literacy;
- 80 per cent of HIV prevention services for populations at high risk of HIV infection, including for women within those populations;
- 60 per cent of programmes to support the achievement of societal enablers”

Break down barriers to achieving HIV outcomes

HIGH LEVEL TARGETS

RESULT AREA

RA 4: Fully recognized, empowered, resourced and integrated **community led HIV responses** for a transformative and sustainable HIV response

RA 5: People living with HIV, key populations and people at risk of HIV enjoy human rights, equality and dignity, **free of stigma and discrimination**

RA 6: Women and girls, men and boys, in all their diversity, practice and promote **gender-equitable social norms and gender equality**, and work together to end gender-based violence and to mitigate the risk and impact of HIV

RA 7: **Young people fully empowered and resourced** to set new direction for the HIV response and unlock the progress needed to end inequalities and end AIDS

30% of testing and treatment services to be delivered by community-led organizations.

80% of service delivery for HIV prevention programmes for key populations and women to be delivered by community-, key population- and women-led organizations.

60% of the programmes support the achievement of societal enablers to be delivered by community-led organizations.

Less than 10% of countries have punitive legal and policy environments that lead to the denial or limitation of access to services.

Less than 10% of people living with HIV and key populations experience stigma and discrimination.

Less than 10% of women, girls, people living with HIV and key populations experience gender-based inequalities and all forms of gender-based violence

Recognising the Role of Adolescent and Young Key Populations

Youth are not a homogenous group

- It is critical that adolescents and youth in all their diversity are engaged in global, regional, and national processes, including service delivery, if we are to achieve our goals for 2025 and 2030
- Global coordination mechanisms such as the Adolescent and Young Key Populations Partnership allow UNAIDS and co-sponsors to be guided on what we can do to support ayKP-led responses
- With a renewed focus on community leadership, it is crucial that we ensure adolescent and young key population leadership is a key part of that



Stigma & discrimination hinder access to education for young people living with HIV, from key populations, with disabilities or in humanitarian settings

By end of 2022, a total of 34 countries were taking action as part of the *Global Partnership to eliminate HIV-related stigma and discrimination*, focusing on six settings including education to **prevent and address violence and discrimination in schools.**

Over 60 countries supported to **implement out-of-school comprehensive sexuality education**, including for young people living with HIV and young key populations (Ethiopia, Ghana, Philippines), young people with disabilities (Malawi), young people in humanitarian settings (Moldova) or young indigenous people (Colombia).



Data

- **Data specifically on adolescent and young key populations continues to be an area highlighted to us**
- Working with cosponsors, we continue to support youth-led monitoring under the #UPROOT umbrella, generating data from youth-led networks, including those led by adolescent and young key populations, to influence policy, service delivery, and Global Fund funding proposals
- ayKP-led networks have demonstrated their effectiveness in engaging young people in all their diversity, and we will continue to support this as a crucial area for supporting achievement of the 30/80/60 targets set out in the Political Declaration and Global AIDS Strategy
